CONGRESSIONAL CONFERENCE.

The Republican Congress for the
18th
Congressional District, comprising
the
counties of Huntingdon, Fulton, Franklin,
Juniata,
Mifflin, Snyder and Union, assembled
in
Conference in Lewistown last
Tuesday
afternoon.

The following is a list of the
conferees
and the county they represented: Union—
H. P.
Glover, G. W. Snook and J. K. Kromer;
Snyder—A. C. Simpson, B. F. Waggoner
and
I. L. Manbeck; Huntingdon—M. G.
Brumbaugh,
Z. J. Jones and J. N. Nash; Juniata—S.
Grubb, J. L. Lynter and J. K. Robinson;
Franklin—G. B.
Waistling, A. N. Pomeroy and S. H. Prather;
Fulton—J. R. Duffield, Judge McKibbin
and
Jere Cronan; Mifflin—G. A. Zarbo, T.
D.
Parker and E. C. Edgar.

An organization was formed by the
election
of H. P. Glover as president, A. N.
Pomeroy
and J. A. Nash as secretaries and B. F.
Waggoner
and J. A. Graybill as tellers.

No motion ballots were ordered to
be
taken in alphabetical order, by viva voce,
and
in case of absentees members present
were
authorized to cast the full vote of the
county.

G. B. Waistling nominated Hastings-Gehr
of
Franklin; Jere Cronan nominated W. L.
McKibbin
of Fulton; Jeremiah Lyons nominated
L. E.
Atkinson of Juniata; R. C. Billinger
nominated
H. J. Culbertson of Mifflin; A. C.
Simpson
nominated A. W. Potter of Juniata; H. P.
Glover
nominated J. P. Miller of Union county.

61 ballots in all were taken and the
meeting
adjourned without result.

The vote remained unchanged during
the
entire session and was as follows:

L. R. Atkinson 6 votes, the delegates
of
both Juniata and Huntingdon voting
for
him. Each of the other candidates had
three
votes; the votes of the conferees of
the
other counties were as follows:

The conference adjourned to meet in
Harrisburg
on October 2d.

It will be seen that Dr. Atkinson's
chances
for a re-nomination are promising as
he
has started out in the conference in
the
lead and retained it through the
conference.
