The form of a potato cannot, as a rule, be changed by the selection for planting any particular form. Two distinct varieties will not mix by planting in the same hill.

Y. importations it's altogether different. With big steamers coming into port every day from Europe, the ocean is little more than a ferry route. I have calculated that on every bushel of European potatoes landed here there is a net profit of twenty five cents. They pay the tariff of fifteen cents a bushel, and still find it profitable to send their potatoes here.


