CHAS. B. CHAFFORD, P. M. The marriage of Mr. Charles H. Felix of Lewistown and Miss Kate Books daughter of Solomon Books of this place, took place at the home of the bride's parents on Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock. The ceremony was performed by Rev. On Sabbath evening Rev. L. Y. Hays delivered his farewell sermon and declared the pulpit of Westminster Presbyterian church vacant. A large congregation was present, it having been previously arranged that Hays should be no preaching in the Lutheran and Methodist churches. Rev. Mr. Graff of the Lutheran church and Rev. Mr. Miller of the Methodist Church occupied places in the pulpit. Mr. Hays and family left for Fort Dodge, Iowa, on Monday evening.

By an act of Legislature approved May 8, 1889, Adjutant Gen. D. H. Hoading is authorized to all the surviving soldiers resident in Pennsylvania, who participated in the battle of Gettysburg on the first, second or third days of July 1863 and who served in any of such Pennsylvania organizations at the time of the dedication of the Pennsylvania organizations. Imprisonment and heavy fine will be imposed on any person who shall attempt to persuade any soldier entitled to the provisions of the act.

The recent decision of the Supreme Court with reference to the licensing of brewers and wholesale dealers, will secure licenses to one hundred and twenty-five persons and companies in Allegheny county that were refused licenses by Judge White, in Pittsburgh the number of licenses will be nearly doubled as the result of the decision. In Philadelphia the effect of the decision will be to add about 2,000 licenses to those already granted, making in all at least 3,400. It is expected that throughout the State hundreds of persons who were refused retail licenses will now apply as wholesalers.

The Mifflin Base Ball Club defeated the Newport Club at Newport last Friday. Score 7 to 4. The Newport boys are reported as having played the part of a surly scolding fighting host. How changed everything became, when the Mifflin club, became the guest of the Bloomfield Club. The Bloomfield boys, came to Newport, on Friday evening and gave the Mifflin boys free transportation to their town and took good care of them till Saturday afternoon when the Mifflin boys carried off the honors of the field. Score 7 to 3, and then saw them off for home in fine style. So all report who were at Bloomfield.

Governor Lowry of Miss., is loathing before the country as a big man. His is the opportunity, that may not again come in many years with the popular heart at his back to teach brewers and gamblers and corporations that they are not bigger people than a state government. Evils in society are hard to correct because people as a rule do not see them and cannot be sufficiently interested to give support to men who do see and desire to correct wrongs upon society generally, but in the case of Governor Lowry vs. the brewers and others, and abettors the public generally has enlightened under standing and are heartily in accord with Governor Lowry.

On the evening of the 3d inst., while celebrating the approaching Fourth, Harry Thompson Kenn, eldest son of A. F. Keim, Esq., was the victim of an accident that might have been serious in results and terminated his earthly career. He and several companions had a small cannon, which was charged with powder and then set off, making a loud report. A fire-tracker fuse was placed in the touch hole of the little gun and then lighted. In one instance it failed to ignite, when he attempted to light it with the end of his cigar, which came in contact with the powder, and the terrible explosion immediately communicated with the contents of the cannon, he receiving the full charge of powder in his face from his nose to the roots of the hair on his forehead. That part of his phiz was peppered with powder grains, none of which, however, lodged in his eyes, and the gun was, fortunately, missed him.—Newport Ledger.

Herbert T. Wright, who so recently came into public notice as a successful miner, and as the discoverer of the carbonate bonanza in the Lucky mine, was born and raised in Juniata county, Pennsylvania. A few years ago he went to Wyoming and followed mining in the Black Hills in Idaho and various other parts of the Rocky mountains, passing through the usual vicissitudes incident to a miner's life. For a time he was in charge of the Spring Mountain mines in Idaho, and also the Fabone and Last Chance mines. He came to New Mexico in 1888, then went to the San Juan country, but returned to San Pedro in June, 1889 and took a working lease on the Lucky mine. On the 29th of January he and his partner, Mr. McDonald struck fairly into the great galena and carbonate bonanza which has so quickly made the carbonate bearing line alone belts in the Therto mountains, famous, and connected Hockensberry, of Honey Grove, Pa., aged 30 days.
