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did not kill the man. He also denied owning a revolver but it was proved by the Oxford Iron Company's books that he had bought one some months before. Blood was found on his clothes and shoes and also on the handle of his revolver, but counsel for the defense tried to show that this was the result of natural causes. This evidence was very damaging to the prisoner. Bolak was tried and convicted at the April term of court and sentenced to be hung by Chief Justice Bentley, who manifested much emotion when passing the death sentence. Bolak is the first person hanged upon the Chief Justice sentenced to death. He has been sentenced many but they have all been commuted except Bolak. He passed the death sentence on Janitor Titus, but Titus went to State's Prison for life. Bolak's wife was present at the trial and has since been devoted to her husband. The prisoner for the most part seemed indifferent to his fate. He was a man of iron nerve and never showed but little feeling. He persistently denied his guilt. He was an inveterate smoker of cigars. He also spent much time in looking at the illustrated papers of the day. Speaking of his approaching death he said: "No fear to die, no kill any man."

Excepting Van Houten, who has hanged 35 persons including Bolak, superintended the execution. He furnished the scaffold, the black cap, the rope the straps and all other articles and got \$150 dollars for his services. The hanging took place in the yard adjoining the jail on the east. The prisoner was taken out through the main hall of the court house and then through the clerk's office.

Bolak was a man of more than ordinary intelligence. He had been a soldier in the Prussian army, and from which he deserted. He was charged with killing a man in the old country and one in Colorado, and was alleged to have been implicated in the Phoebe Paulin murder, on Orange Mountain some years ago. He was about thirty five years of age. His remains were taken to Washington for burial.
