Lucien Wilson, a prominent citizen of this county, died, at his home at Oakland Mills on the 23rd of September last, aged 70 years, 11 months, 3 days. Interment in the Presbyterian graveyard near McAlisterville.

A hamper on, named James Foy, crept from another stable occupied by Hartwig, whose rider, David Sellers, had locked the door from the outside and was promenading in town in company with James Weaver and two young ladies when the fire began.

From the Bloomfield Advocate of September 25: Last Thursday night Mr. Grigg's horse and buggy were taken from his stable, in Newport, and after being driven all night abandoned at Mr. Isaiah M. Gantt's, in Juniata township, where they were recovered the next morning in a pretty bad condition.
