CAMERON voted as the farmers believe on the coin question, and is stronger to-day in Pennsylvania, than ever before.

The Pennsylvania Legislature passed a resolution requesting Senator Cameron and Quay to vote for the Federal Election bill now pending in Congress.

There is a compulsory education school bill on its passage in the Legislature. Write to your Member and Senator to vote against such an un-American law.

If Congress would pass a bill for the free coinage of silver, and if it would become a law by the President signing it, speculation in silver would be at an end.

The Kansas Legislature sends a man named Pfeffer to succeed Ingalls in the United States Senate. Pfeffer is an alliance man, about 60 years old and a Pennsylvanian by birth.

Report has it that Senators Woods, of Millin county, and Williamson of Huntingdon called on President Harrison the other day to pay their respects. The President inquired, "Am I to understand that Pennsylvania is still a Republican state."

The modest gentlemen were stumped into silence by the Presidential inquiry, and before they recovered their speech the President bade them "Good Day." Silence.

WILLIAM WINDOM, Secretary of the United States Treasury, after having made a speech, at a banquet given by the Board of Trade and Transportation of New York City took his seat and immediately died, on the night of January 29 at 10.05 o'clock. Consternation seized upon all present. It was a case of joy turned into mourning.

The general trend of his speech was all in favor of two objects, first, that of the building up of American commerce, by government subsidy for American ships, second, the single coin, or gold standard of value. He was born in Ohio in 1827.

From the best authorities it appears that the National debt of the western nations is about twenty-three thousand million dollars—this is not counting the state, county, city, town and township debts or individual debts.—To meet that the National indebtedness in gold, there is about three thousand million dollars in gold among the western nations. What a feast it is to be invited to pay 23 thousand million dollars, with three thousand million dollars. Such is the financial grip that the gold men would impose on the country. Instead of denouncing Senator Cameron for voting for the free coinage of silver every debtor and every man who favors a better time financially should thank him for that vote. If you want harder times denounce Cameron for voting for free coinage of silver.

Farmers' Alliance Platform. The National Farmers Alliance Convention met last week in Chicago and before adjournment adopted the following:

Resolved: That we most emphatically declare against the present system of Government as manipulated by the Congress of the United States and members of the Legislatures of the several States. Therefore, we declare in favor of holding a Convention on February 22, 1892, to fix a date and place for the holding of a Convention to nominate candidates for the office of President and Vice President of the United States. We declare that in the Convention to be held on February 22, 1892, that representation shall be one delegate from each State in the Union.

Resolved: That we favor the abolition of national banks, and that the surplus funds be loaned to individuals on land security at a low rate of interest.

Resolved: That we demand foreclosure of mortgages that the government holds on railroads.

Resolved: That the President and Vice President of the United States be elected by popular vote instead of by an Electoral College.

Resolved: That the Alliance shall take no part in a political struggle as affiliating with Republicans or Democrats.

Resolved: That we favor the free and unlimited coinage of silver.

Resolved: That the volume of the currency be increased to \$50 per capita.

Resolved: That all paper money be placed on an equality with gold. That we, as land-owners, pledge ourselves to demand that the Government allow us to borrow money from the United States at the same rate of interest as do the bankers. That Senators of the United States shall be elected by vote of the people.

Horse and Jackass Fight. LEXINGTON, Ky., Jan. 26.—A battle to the death took place in Mercer county to-day between a valuable saddle stallion and a jackass belonging to William Thomas, a stock raiser. A few days ago a mad dog bit Thomas' little boy and the horse. Yesterday the horse went mad, and kicking down the door to the jack's stable, began biting him. The jack retaliated, and for fifteen minutes they fought, using their teeth, hoofs and fore feet. Finally the jack tore the stallion's left ear loose with his teeth, and the horse then bit a piece from the jack's neck.

This seemed to make the jack more ferocious than ever, and grabbing the lower part of the horse's neck in his teeth, tore out his windpipe, but the high-mettled stallion

did not give up, and before falling he kicked the jack on the left hind leg, breaking it just below the hock. The horse then fell dead. The jack uttered a long, loud bray and rushed into his stable. He was covered with blood and wounded unto death, so that his owner killed him to put him out of misery. The boy was taken to a madstone. The stone stuck three times, and he shows no signs of rabies. It is believed he will recover.

To Colored People. This from the Philadelphia Record, January 27, 1891.—Fred Ford, a colored man of the typical Southern type, residing at No. 628 North Second Street, has recently become convinced that Judaism offers him the only road to salvation, and a few days ago in pursuance of his conviction, he approached the Rabbi Ben J. Mossolin, of the Anti-Ethnic Synagogue, of this city. Ford told the Israelite how for three long years he had tested his religion, having gone through all the rites and ceremonies with them, and that he believed his choice was unwavering. Could he be received in membership with them?

The Rabbi looked at him. The look decided the question. Ford was not of the right color, and was told he could not be received. A proselyte was lost, but, as the rabbi afterward explained: "We are opposed to any negro becoming one of us, and intend that the purity of the blood of the Jews shall be maintained. Why mix pure blood?"
