

The Indiana Senate has passed a radical bill against trusts.

When the resolution was sent to Governor Pattison, he promptly vetoed it, on the ground that a Congressional act of that kind, trenches upon state sovereignty, and that gives to the President and courts dangerous powers to interfere with elections of the people in the states.

**America for America**—President Harrison has by proclamation, announced a treaty with Brazil by which Brazil may send here, free of duty, such products of that country that we need and do not produce, and by which treaty we may send there free of duty such products that we produce and they need—that is reciprocity.

Free coinage of silver was beaten the fourth time in the lower house of Congress last Friday—An effort was made to tack it on the Sundry Civil Appropriation bill, but the motion was defeated by a vote of 134 to 127. The gold men against silver are backed by the bankers, and the silver men are backed by the grange and alliance people, who are a mighty force, forgoing to the front in politics, social and educational affairs.

Senator Wood's bill for June flood bridge expenses has been favorably reported from the senate judiciary committee. It is one of the bills that should by all means pass the Legislature and receive the signature of the Governor. The highest duty of government is to give protection to its citizens in time of distress and lift burdens that have been imposed by calamity that the people have no other agency in bringing upon themselves.

From the Philadelphia Record: The attention which Washington Society are bestowing on a delegation of Sioux Indians would be ridiculous if they were not unmeaning. These savages have been followed to church, gazed upon as if they were the saviors of the country, invited to teas, receptions and dances; and yet only a few weeks ago, these "so called braves" were terrorizing a whole state, and only waiting for a favorable opportunity to practice their fiendish brutality on helpless women and children.
