As the thief ransacked about the room Mr. Bowersox awoke and, seeing a man, he called Mr. Kern, thinking it was he, but when a snick lantern was turned, he discovered his mistake, and jumped out of bed, grasped the thief and a tussle ensued. Several shots were fired by the thief when he made good his escape. The thief left a fine fur cap in the house as a token of remembrance.

The flood last week in Pittsburg did great damage. Nearly every iron mill was flooded and closed down, railroad tracks washed away, squares upon squares of streets flooded to the second story and thousands of cellars filled. The highest loss by the flood cannot fall less than \$1,000,000. The poor living along the river suffered so greatly, that appeals for aid have been issued by the Mayor of Allegheny.

The greatest losses of course fall upon the downtown wholesale stores, and the river-side establishments out on Penn avenue, where fully three miles of cellars were filled to the first floor and goods damaged beyond repair. Add to this, building inspectors say the flooded districts have suffered great injury in

the way of damaged foundations and buildings. From the Bloomfield Advocate of the 18 inst.—Our Liverpool correspondent sends us the following: On Friday while E. K. Biting, groceryman at Upper Liverpool lock, was gathering drift wood along the river bank, his attention was attracted by a number of crows around one particular spot. Upon investigation he found, partly buried, a male infant child about a month old with one arm eaten off and the hair missing from the head. Dr. E. Walt Snyder county coroner, was notified. A jury was empaneled, whose verdict at this writing (Saturday) we have not learned. A thorough investigation will be made, and it is brought to justice. The body was interred by undertaker Decker.

Later—The jury rendered a verdict: "That the male infant came to his death by violent and unnatural means at the hands of some person or persons to the inquest unknown."

From the McVeytown Journal of last week—The residence of Sam'l McWilliams was entered by burglars on last Thursday morning about one o'clock. They climbed in at a window in which Mrs. McWilliams had her house plants and which was without a sash lock. The thief stood on a bench and carefully removed the potted plants placing them on the ground and then entered the building and ransacked the pockets of what clothing was lying about down stairs, the only spoils found being a full plug of chewing tobacco belonging to Mr. McW.

The thief or thieves then went up stairs into J. T. McWilliams' room and secured his trousers containing the keys of his store and safe. The click of a trailing suspender buckle on the stairs awakened Taylor, who at once grasped the situation and finding his trousers gone gave the alarm, and subsequently aroused the neighbors, but the birds had flown under cover of the darkness. The trousers were afterwards found in the yard having been disturbed. It is supposed that the object was to secure the keys of the store or bank with a view to mere profitable operation. We next hear of them an hour later invading the domicile of Alex. Correll at Mattawana. Mr. Correll's suspicions were first aroused by footsteps on the outside and being forewarned he awaited further developments and next heard the intruder down stairs, then on the hall up stairs. Mr. C. however, had no confidence in his revolver which was only partially loaded and not knowing in what force the enemy was present hesitated about advancing in the dark, so he opened his bedroom door and said get out of here, and of course they hastily retired without saying good night, taking along a child's motor boat containing about \$12. The broken bank was afterwards found at Atkinson's lumber yard.
