Robbery of a Stranger. On Monday evening, December 7, 1891, James B. Rickenbaugh, teams ter, of Herndon, Northumberland county, got off Mail Express at 8 55 to attend court in Mifflintown, as a witness in the horse suit of Erb vs. Witmer, and went to the National Hotel and asked for lodging for the night.

The man at the bar told him, "We are full, and cannot accommodate you to night."

George Hackenberger, employed in the ice works, in Patterson, was there, and said, "I can give you a room and bed for the night, if you will go with me, my wife is not at home."

Rickenbaugh says he looked at the man behind the bar and winked, as much as to say, "How is that?"

Rickenbaugh says they started for Hackenberger's home, and had not walked far till he lost sight of Kennedy, and did not see him till they were at the canal bridge, when I said, "Can't we have a little fun?"

Kennedy came then, and said, "I don't know where Hackenberger went, but Kennedy walked on my left side, and we turned and walked, and after a little while he struck me on the left side of the head about the ear.
