Two Mormon preachers visited Lewistown and Huntingdon last week looking for a foot-hold to start missionary Mormon work in central Pennsylvania. It is true that about half the people in central Pennsylvania do not have church connection. but while that is true it is not probable that the people who are not con-nected with churches, will desire to connect themselves with a church like that of the Mormons. There are men inside and outside of church circles, who do not heritate to have one and two and three women, and at the same time condemn such practices, and when such people fail to connect themselves with a polygamous church, there is no earthly chanch for Mormon missionaries to get a start in the highlands of Pennsylvania. The missionaries did not visit Juniata county. This county is too orthadox for them to think of stopping here.
