

Court Proceedings.

Court convened on Monday A. M., the 7th, with Judges Lyons, Wickham and Barton upon the bench. The grand jury was called, sworn and charged by the Court. But one bill was presented to the grand jury, and they were through with their deliberations and discharged for the term before noon.

R. G. Dobbs, James Fry and S. C. Stoner, coaches, were returned to wait upon the court.

Noble Prospektus were entered by leave of court by District Attorney Schweyer in the following fornication and bastardy cases: Com. vs. Howard Naylor; Com. vs. Charles Underwood, and Com. vs. James O. Ramp.

In Lang vs. Lang, Divorce. Will L. Hoopes was appointed Commissioner to take testimony.

Annie E. Campbell vs. John A. Campbell. Publication in divorce awarded.

Wm. M. Allison, Esq., was appointed to audit the public officers' accounts.

In estate of J. N. Thompson, dec'd, answer of James Thompson, dec'd, to rule filed.

Wilberforce Schweyer, Esq., was appointed an auditor in the estate of J. N. Thompson, dec'd.

Answer to rule to show cause in N. C. Hower's use vs. W. N. Sterrett et al., filed.

An interpleader was directed upon petition of the sheriff to try the ownership of property levied on writ against George Leitzel, et al., and claimed by Huldah Leitzel, W. H. Minich being the plaintiff.

Assigned estate of Samuel M. Coffman. Sale of real estate to Joseph W. Gingrich, confirmed.

Estate of John Fulkroder, deceased. Sale of real estate confirmed.

Estate of Wm. Leach, deceased. Sale of real estate confirmed.

Estate of Isaac N. Tharp. Appraisement to widow of \$300 confirmed.

Samuel I. Stoner, Esq., was appointed to take testimony in Mifflintown borough vs. Walker township, appeal from order of removal.

B. F. Burdfield, Esq., was appointed to take testimony in same borough vs. same township, appeal, &c.

Joseph Soller, Menno S. Graybill and John G. Gingrich, were appointed viewers of a road from Basler's to Lester's in Fayette township.

A rule was granted on Overseers of Mifflintown to show cause why order of removal of Mary Dapple to Walker township, should not be quashed.

Sale of real estate of A. J. Ferguson, deceased, by heirs of private sales, approved and guardian of minors allowed to join in deed.

Charles B. Crawford, Esq., District Attorney elect, took the oath of office.

Upon application of the District Attorney, the indictment against Charles W. Runney was not pressed.

J. Andrew Martin, Joseph Sisher and Jacob Killmer, were appointed to view a site for a bridge over Mahontonga creek in Susquehanna township.

There were but two Commonwealth cases for trial. The first was that of Com. vs. John Gilliford, Charge, Fornication and bastardy. Prosecutrix, Amy Fisher. This case was tried at the September term and then resulted in a verdict of guilty. A new trial was granted the defendant at the September argument court. The case came up for second trial on Monday noon and was a hotly contested case. Verdict, guilty. Motion for a new trial filed.

Com. vs. Alfred Campbell, fornication and bastardy. Prosecutrix, Mary Jane Pannebacker. Tried. Verdict guilty and the usual sentence imposed. The defendant not complying with the conditions of the sentence is now luxuriating in Castle Calhoun as the guest of the Sheriff. This case closed the commonwealth business.

But two of the cases on the civil list were tried, they taking up the time of the court until adjournment on Friday evening.

The first case was that of a feigned issue framed to test the validity of the codicil to the will of G. W. Smith, late of Mifflintown, deceased. G. W. Smith died in the spring of 1885, leaving a will which was attached a codicil. In that will which was in Delaware township to his son Wm. G. Smith and the mansion house in Mifflintown was given to his son Darwin C. Smith, he having but two children. On the 21st of April 1894, Mr. Smith executed a codicil to his will, changing his devise to his son Darwin C. Smith in this way:—That instead of taking the mansion house in Mifflintown in fee, he Darwin C. have a life interest in it, and at his death the property to go to his children, grand-children of G. W. Smith, and that the debts of the testator should be chargeable to this property.

D. C. Smith not being satisfied with this devise, then began this proceeding to break the will of his father at the time of the making of his will was of unsound mind, that is, that his mind was not of testamentary capacity. 2nd, that undue influence on the part of Wm. G. Smith his brother had been used to have his father make or execute this codicil which virtually deprived him and his children of any share in his father's estate as the debts amount almost to the value of the mansion house. 3rd, that the codicil to the will was not properly executed. The case was most vigorously contested on both sides and the evidence was most conflicting. However the jury after being out several hours returned a verdict for Wm. G. Smith or in other words sustained the codicil. The case attracted a great deal of attention as many of our prominent citizens were witnesses on the one side or the other, but the prevailing opinion now that the case is over is that the jury were right in their finding.

Hon. Martin Bell presided during

ing the trial of this case as Judge Lyons was one of the witnesses.

Byron L. Shuman vs. Pennsylvania Railroad Company; No. 125 September term, 1896; Summons in trespass; plea, "Not Guilty." Continued.

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
