It is often the case that handsome marble becomes almost hopelessly soiled and stained, and there is a demand for a simple, practical recipe for restoring it. The following from an excellent authority is highly commended: Take equal parts of oxgall powdered soap and pipe clay, and a little turpentine. Apply a coating to the marble, and when thoroughly dry rub it off and wash with warm soft water. This will cleanse without destroying the polish. If the marble is badly stained, a second application may be necessary.

AWFUL.
At 11 o'clock Saturday morning the frame house occupied by William Croyle, which was situated on the outskirts of Bedford, was discovered to be on fire, and before an alarm could be given the whole structure was in flames.

Mrs. Croyle succeeded in throwing two of the children out of the window to the father below. It is supposed she went back to get the other two children and was suffocated, for she disappeared from the window and was not seen again.

When the dead bodies of the mother and children were taken from the ruins of the house nothing but the trunks remained. The legs, arms and heads were burned off. The 2-week-old baby, which was thrown out of the window, is so severely burned that it will probably die from the effects. The father was also burned about the head and arms.

The Bubonic Plague.
The history of the true bubonic plague dates back to the third century before Christ. In the sixth century, it prevailed in Europe and Egypt, lasting fifty years. It is said that in Constantinople it carried off 10,000 in one day. It prevailed in the fourteenth century throughout Europe, and also in the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries.

In the first half of the seventeenth century, it still prevailed in Europe. In 1656, it is said to have carried off 300,000 persons within five months in London. The great plague in London was in 1664. The total number of deaths from the plague in London in 1665, was estimated at 100,000. It prevailed also throughout various portions of Europe in the eighteenth century. It prevailed also throughout various portions of Europe in the nineteenth century.

In the nineteenth century it prevailed in Constantinople, Russia, India, China, Egypt, Arabia and Persia. The last outbreak of the plague in European soil was that of 1874 and 1879 in the neighborhood of Astrakhan, on the Volga in Russia. The plague of London began in December 1664, there being as many as 6,000 deaths a week, and it was scarcely stayed when the great fire of London broke out. The whole city was in flames, and the seeds of the disease were destroyed.

When it prevailed in Russia in 1878, the "double cordon" was established. A line of soldiers encircled all the suspected territory and another the district where infection was known to exist. So deadly was the disease that the percentage of deaths quickly rose to 100, every patient, every doctor and every nurse dying when the plague was at its height. It became necessary therefore to clear the people out of some towns in the valley of the Volga and burn every house to the ground.

Why Ice Water is Injurious.
The reason why so many physicians object to the drinking of water during meals is that Americans, as a rule, drink ice water. The temperature of the stomach is from 98 to 100 Fahrenheit. After a meal it should be from 99 to 102, and if a person is expelling it sometimes will run up to 103. Now this temperature is necessary to carry on digestion in a perfectly healthful way. Constant drinking of ice water during the meal or at the close of the meal will reduce the temperature of the stomach sometimes to 95, which would stop digestion and sooner or later under one a confirmed dyspeptic. Water of an ordinary temperature is not so objectionable. In fact, it would be better to take a swallow of water now and then during the meal provided the water is cool, not iced. Foods that are slightly diluted are more easily digested than those which are concentrated and dry.
