Lewistown News.—Nearly all the lead tobacco raised in Northumberland county in portions of which it is quite extensively cultivated has been sold to buyers. The '99 crop was purchased on the poles before it was stripped by the producers. The rising of the weed will no doubt be a profitable pursuit during the next four or five years, and growers will increase their acreage. This is due evidently to the Spanish-American war in Cuba and Porto Rico, where it had been quite extensively raised.

Since the shooting accidents last week we have heard of half a dozen narrow escapes from being shot with target guns. In one case the ball passed through a man's hat. CONGREGATIONAL MEETING. Pursuant to a call regularly read from the pulpit at the Presbyterian church, a congregational meeting of that denomination was held in the main room of the Westminster Presbyterian church last Sunday morning after the regular church services, the meeting was called to take action on the resignation of Rev. A. N. Raven, who has a unanimous call from one of the leading churches of Seattle, Washington State. Mr. John R. Jenkins presided at the meeting, having been chosen on motion of Mr. Wm. Banks whilst on motion of Gen'l Wm. Bell, Chas. B. Crawford acted as Secretary. The resignation of the pastor was duly read and the following resolutions presented by Mr. M. P. Crawford were adopted in relation thereto, the same upon subsequent motion being directed to be published in the Millintown papers and also presented to Mr. Raven. Following the adoption of the resolutions Mr. M. P. Crawford was appointed by the meeting a delegate to convey the action of the congregation to the next meeting of the Presbytery of Huntingdon.

RESOLUTIONS. Whereas the Rev. A. N. Raven has deemed it advisable to tender his resignation as pastor of the Westminster Presbyterian Church of Millintown, Pa., that he may accept a call to the Taylor Church of Seattle, Washington, and whereas it becomes us to take action on the same both with reference to the congregation and with reference to the Presbytery of Huntingdon, in our recommendation thereto, therefore be it resolved:

That, although we sorely regret his leaving us whom he has served ably and zealously, yet in consideration of the fact that he has been called to a larger field of usefulness, we feel it our duty to release him from his labors here, accept his resignation and unite with him in asking the Presbytery to dissolve the pastoral relation now existing between himself and the Westminster church.

Resolved, further that we recommend him to the people of Seattle in general and to the church he is to serve in particular as a courteous gentleman, an able preacher and a faithful pastor, whose ministrations in the gospel among our people have been highly instructive and beneficial.

Resolved, that in giving up our pastor to the people of Seattle, we can assure them of his zeal and fidelity and heartily express the belief that if they give him proper support and encouragement their church will be greatly prospered.
