WHEATMAN'S PROCLAMATION. WHEREAS, by an act of General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An act to regulate the nomination and election of public officers approved the 10th day of June 1893. It is made the duty of every county within the Commonwealth to give notice of any general election to be held therein to enumerate the officers to be elected and the names of all the candidates used as provided in aforesaid act of Assembly, designate the places at which the elections are to be held, and give notice to certain persons holding certain offices of profit or trust are incapable of holding or exercising at the same time the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector or Clerk of any election of this Commonwealth. Therefore, I, S. Clarton Stone, High Sheriff of the County of Juniata, do hereby make known and give this Public Notice to the electors of the county of Juniata that on

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 6, 1900, it being the first Tuesday after the first Monday of said month—a general election will be held in the several election districts in said county, at which time they will vote by ballot for the following named officers:

THIRTY-TWO PERSONS FOR PRESIDENTIAL ELECTORS. One person for the Office of Auditor General. Two persons for the office of Representative at Large in Congress. One person for Senator in the General Assembly. One person for Representative in the General Assembly. One person for the Office of Register and Recorder and Clerk of the Orphans' Court. highest number of votes shall not attend, the person who shall have received the second highest number of votes shall act as inspector in his place; and in case the person elected judge shall not attend, then the inspector who received the highest number of votes shall appoint a judge in his place; and if any vacancy shall continue in the board for the space of one hour after the time fixed by law for the opening of the election, the qualified voters of the township, ward or district for which such officer shall have been elected, present at the place of election, shall elect one of their number to fill such vacancy.

I also hereby make known and give notice, that every person excepting Justices of the Peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the government of the United States, or of this State, or of any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under legislative, executive or judicial department of this State, or of the United States, or of any city or incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature and the select or common council of any city, or commissioners of any incorporated district, is by law, incapable of holding or exercising at the same time the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector or clerk of any election in this Commonwealth, and that no inspector, judge, or other officer of any such election shall be eligible to any office to be voted for, except that of an election officer.
