Susquehanna County Farmers Club

Continuation of the question "When and where will you draw and spread your manure to realize the best results?" from last week; Question discussed March 4th 1876.

"Apollo Stone's spread manure in his orchard right after haying and sowed plaster on a part of the piece the same day, and the next year there was twice as much hay where he sowed the plaster as there was where he did not sow it.

Mr. L. C. Catlin says that for several years he has used the manure, of from five to eight horses for top-dressing his meadows and he knows it is a great benefit; that for ten years past he has not plowed manure under; that he would rather have one load put on top than two down.

Mr. Kirby Bunnell said that the American people are very much interested in the subject we are now discussing. From the fact that the farmers to-day do not receive a fair compensation for their work; for this reason it is necessary to discuss these important questions in order to make the most of what we have.

Mr. R. S. Searle said that the drift of the discussion satisfied him that our farmers, as a whole, are beginning to know how to use manure; that in most cases they have used cow manure not assimilated—not worked over—not properly prepared for plant food; that otherwise it is not in proper shape for any crop.

The question to be discussed at the next meeting is: "How shall we treat our dairies to realize the best results?" It is intended that the care and management of the cows shall be included in the discussion of this question.

scatter it plentifully in the stalls, and especially in the manure piles, and keep the piles square instead of letting them run up like a great benefit that the plaster holds the moisture in the manure, and keeps the ammonia till it is applied to the ground; that he read the other day in an agricultural paper that a man made a square pen for his manure, and leveled the manure and all the affects from the house he threw in there, keeping the heap level and occasionally throwing some plaster over it.

Mr. John Trumbull says: "For the last 30 years I have baled and sold three-fourths of my hay, and, of course, have taken some pains to learn the best way to use manure; I have tried top-dressing, spreading in the fall and spreading some in the spring. When it has been a wet fall I have seen good results, but it never lasts so long as when I plow it under."

Mr. C. J. Holister's practice is to put the manure on the furrow and drag it in with the crop; that he never failed to get a good seeding except once unless it is when the oats fall down and kill it. He always manures corn ground—says it is a hard matter to get manure out in planting time—says he has drawn and piled manure in the early part of winter but did not realize the benefit from it.

We would suggest that the different results that have been reached by top-dressing may have been caused by a difference in quantity of manure applied to the acre. A small quality, either, of course, of fine manure would soon dry out, while a large quantity would retain the moisture. Farmers all know the effect of a shower on grass that has been partially cured.

The substance of each has been put under one head, and that accounts for this statement of Mr. Searle, which we think is correct.
