This of course does not represent the incomes, but the amount of substantial property in actual use.

Whether or not the vast forces represented in these accumulations of property represent a parallel increase of moral purity and spirituality may be doubted. It is possible that the reverse may be true, that many people have come to think that a failure in personal devotion to good works is in a measure commuted in donations of money. Many prominent men in the pulpit say that this is so, and so far as it is true it goes to counteract the idea that the increase of the members and wealth of churches is a spread of true christianity.
