After turning them out to the pasture, he put one peck of dry ashes per week on the ground in the pasture. They ate it all and guawed off the grass where it had been laying. The cattle began to improve, gaining flesh and looking better than they had for several years. He says this morbid appearance was unnoticed years ago, from the fact that the ground was new and ashy from the barning of woods and land clearings. Since this discovery, he gives one quart of salt mixed with one quart of ashes, to twelve head of cattle about once a week.

### Raising Grain and Making Beef und Pork.

If a farmer is a judicious manager and has a correct understanding of all the details incident to raising coarse grain, maintaining the fertility of his land and making beef mutton and pork, he can make more money by having his grain consumed at home and changed into meat than can be made by selling it. In a practical point of view this is nothing more than what farmers on the Western prairies are in the habit of doing every year.
