OUR OLD SENATE CHAMBER-SUPREME COURT OF THE UNITED STATES-THE OPENING OF COURT—REVERDY JOHNSON -ALBERT PIKE.

No one who comes to Washington to "see the sights" for the first time, particularly, should fail to visit the Old Senate Chamber, in the south-eastern part of the main, or central, portion of the Capitol. This hall is now occupied by the Supreme Court of the United States. It is a beautiful room, and most elegantly proportioned. It is semicircular in form and the roof is dome-shaped, while a skylight transmits a soft, subdued light over the apartment. This hall is seventy-five feet long, forty five feet high, and fory-five feet wide in the centre, or widest part. A now of handsome pillars of green porphyritic Potomac marole, extends along the eastern side of the room,

the main door of entrance, on the west side, is a raised platform, which is fronted by a railing, tastefully draped. Behind this are arranged the chairs of the Court Justice and his right associates. Over their heads still remains the famous eastern gallery of the Old Senate. The seats and desks of the lawyers are in front of the court and separated from the rest CLAIRVOYANT EXAMINATIONS FREE.

In this room, hallowed by the memory of our greatest and wisest statesmen, is held the highest and purest legal tribu-nal in the country. Here are decided all civil cases in which the states appear as contesting parties, except in the case of a state versus its own citizens.
