[Continued From Last Week.] Mr. L. T. Birchard says: "I have tried the Alderney, Durhams and crosses between them. I like the Durham breed, partly on account of the calves. I keep my calves till they are four or five weeks old, then sell them. I sold twelve calves at an average of \$7.14. I like to have cows come in early. The Alderneys give nice milk. The Alderneys crossed with the Durhams are about as good as we can get. Last season we concluded to test our cows; so we got some test cups made and marked off into 16th inches. Mr. Birchard exhibited a cup which I guess was about 7 or 8 inches deep and 5 inches in diameter. I did not examine the cup but I guess there is a strip soldered in one side, from top to bottom, so as to show the depth of milk and cream by a side view. Farmers should use the test cup to test their cows with. They are deceived in their cows. I got a cow of Mr. Jessup that gives a good quality of milk. Having the milk about six inches deep in the cup, I have had the cream rise from 12-16ths to 1 inch thick." He read the following article which we give in full, as he considered it important:
