HANDS-FULL, HAND-FULLS, OR HANDS ?-Editors Democrat: About the correctness of the two compound words above given, teachers and scholars appear to differ. I would be in favor of the obsolescence of both expressions and of adopting instead the word "hands." We say, "bushels of grain, pecks of feed, quarts of oats, gallons of molasses, barrels of flour, (the milk, buckets of water, etc." Then why not before ordering elsewhere. say "hands of berries, hands of candy, hands of nuts, hands of raisins, hands of crackers, etc?" Also, "spoons of sugar, spoons of flour, spoons of salt, large spoons of milk, small spoons of medicine, arms of wood, thimbles of seed, dippers of water, cups of tea, etc?" The principle idea is the quantity, and not the measure by which the quantity is determined.

You say, "John, please draw three bucketsfull of water and put it into this tub." John may reply: "There is but one bucket in the well, where shall I find the other two?" If you say "bucket-fulls" of water, the word "fulls" is plainly superfluous, the plural being easily denoted by adding "s" to "bucket." We think it would convey the idea of quantity as well to say "three buckets of water."

Of course the foregoing remarks do not apply to the separate words, hands' fulls; persons may have their hands full, and heads full. and say "There are too heads full of brains," but not "Two heads-full of brains," nor "two head-fulls of brains." STENO.
