At the hearing before Alderman Parsons on Friday last, several, witnesses were examined on the part of the prosecution, and no one could testify to the least thing against this officer and he was promptly and rightly discharged. The arrest of these parties, except the Sheriff have been made upon the information of llessrs. Paine & Dickson furnished by the new board of Auditors, now in session. The exact character and extent of the charges pending against these officers is not as yet generally known: There are different accusations against them which will be thoroughly investigated in due time by the courts, and it is desired that vindicated in open court.

Other arrests are still looked for, and the end may not yet be reached.— Union.

EPISCOPAL CONVENTION.—The 92d convenlion of the Episcopal church for the diocese of Pennsylvania, was in session in St. Andrew's church, Philadelphia, on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of last week. The chair was occupled by Bishop Stevens, and there was a full attendance of delegates. The first day was occupied with preliminary business. On Wednesday forencon full religious services were held, the annual sermon being preached by Rev. Dr. Buchanan, of the Oxford church.— The speaker reviewed the progress of the church for the last sixty years. In 1814 there were but 200 clergy and 5,000 or 6,000 commu-280,000 communicants; 45 dioceses and 3,000 parishes. In the diocese of Philadelphia there are 260 parishes, 217 clergymen, and 31,000 communicants. Bishop Stevens read his anmual address, referring to the events of the past Year. He had confirmed 2,133 persons, delivered 213 sermons, consecrated 4 churches, organica dates for holy-orders. He referred also to the proposed opening of the Centennial on Sunday condemning that course very strongly. Itis matter was further pursued by the offering o resolution by Rev. B. E. Appleton, thanking the

Centennial Commission for the "manly, dignified and Christain stand" it had taken on the su oject. This gave rise to a protracted debate on Wednesday and Thursday, several ministers and laymen taking the position that this was a matter in which the Convention had no right to interfere. Finally, on Thursday, after in effectual efforts to amend it, Mr. Appleton's other work in proportion. resolution was adopted. Much time was consumed in electing the Standing Committee, which when completed was as follows:-Rev. H. J. Morton, Rev. D. R. Goodwin, Rev. J. H. Eccleston, Rev. D. S. Miller, Rev. Benjamin Watson, George C. Morris, Edward Olmstead, John Clayton, Isaac Hazelhurst and James S. Biddle. Nearly all the members are said to be "low church." The Convention dissolved on Thursday afternoon, after agreeing to meet at the same place next year.
