A NICE GAME TO WHICH THE CITY TREAS TRER OF SCRANTON CONFESSED.—A few weeks ago J. H. Millspaugh, City Treasurer of Scranton, informed his attorneys (Henry M. Hoyt and Henry W. Palmer, esqs., of Wilkesbarre,) that he, as City Treasurer, had returned to the State \$5,000 less than the licenses paid into his offices aggregated. He also stated that he had some time before been approached by John A. Waggoner a clerk in the Auditor General's office when Hartranst was the incumbent, who informed him how he could enter into a profitsble speculation. Subsequently Waggoner introduced him to Marshall S. Smith, a clerk in the State Treasurer's Department, and arrangements were made to fix up the City Treasurer's return so that the State would be defrauded out. of \$5,000, which was to be divided among these three persons. Of this amount \$2,500 went to Millspaugh, while Smith and Waggoner received the balance. The City Treasurer was advised to make public this transaction and refund the money he had illegally taken from the State, and on Thursday last a week, Mr. Palmer, one of his counsel, informed the Attorney. General of the fraud. On Tuesday of last week Messrs. Palmer, Millspaugh and Smith had an interview in Harrisburg, at which the Tusion, all prepared with care. matter was fully discussed. The City Treasurer agreed to pay over to the State the money unlawfully in his hands and the treasury clerk also promised to transfer to the State the other . \$2,500, the latter payment to be made the same evening. He failed to meet his obligations, and on Wednesday, Governor Hartranst made the information before the mayor of the facts, and on Saturday last, Marshall S. Smith was taken into custody while in the performance of his duties as clerk and John A. Waggoner was ar rested at his home. Smith is alleged to have stated his inability to refund the \$2,500 which he was requested to pay to the State on the ground that the money was divided among two other persons beside himself, who have his means. He expects to be released on bail.

THE TRAMP LAW.—The tramp law passed Governor, among its provisions declares that Candies. "All persons going about from door to door or placing themselves in streets, highways of otherroads to beg or gather alms, and all other persons wandering abroad and begging, who have no fixed place of residence in the township, ward or borough in which the vagrant is arrested; and all persons who shall come from any place without this Commonwealth to any place within it and shall be found loitering or residing therein, and he shall follow no labor, trade, occupation or business, and have no visible means of subsistence, and can give no reasonable account of themselves or their lusiness in such place," are declared to be vaginats. Any person so found can be, under section 2d of said Act, arrested, or caused to be drrested and compelled to labor upon any county tarm, or upon the roads and highways of say city, lownship or borough, or in any house of cortection, poor-house, work-house, or common lail, for a term not less than thirty days, and not exceeding six months. Section Eighth provides "That all poor houses, alms houses and other places provided for the keeping of the Come at once. poor, are hereby declared to be work-louses for the purpose of this act; and it is hereby made the duty of the custodian of such buildings to Movide work for such vagrants, and to compet six hours a day,"

NEW APPRENTICE LAW.--Any person who shall, either in an individual capacity, or as a member of any association, attempt by any unlawful means whatever, to prevent any mechanic, employer or person having charge of any manufacturing business from taking as an apprentice any minor whose parents or guardians, are desirous of apprenticing said minor, or when such minor is without parents or guardians, and desires to apprentice himself or her self, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof in a proper Court of Quarter Sessions, shall be sentenced to pay a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars, or to imprisonment not exceeding three months, or both, or either, at the discretion of the Court.
