letter, for it gives everyone an opportunity to know what the officers elected to do their public business are doing with their money—

On the 12th day of April, 1875, the Governor approved an act which was supplementary to the act of 20th of April, 1874; declaring that the statement to be published in at least two newspapers must be at the end of the fiscal year, and not in January, as required by said act of 20th April 1874.

First—The auditors are required in each borough and township to settle the annual accounts thereof, and publish the same not only in newspapers, but also by written or printed statements, put up in the most public places in the respective boroughs and townships as soon after the close of the fiscal year, which is on the first Monday in April, as possible.

Second—If the borough or township is in debt, has a funded or floating debt, this must be included in the statement, together with the valuation of property, etc., and published in at least two papers, and embraced in the written or printed statement also.
