Rev. Silas Barner, appointed to deliver the opening address, being providentially detained, Rev. F. A. Doney, alternate, delivered a brief address.

Rev. I. T. Walker, P. E. was elected President, J. H. Weston, Vice President, and D. C. Barnes Sec. for the ensuing year.

The association resolved to hold a camp-meeting, Providence permitting, upon the old camp grounds at Dimock, commencing Aug. 23, and continuing nine days.

Essays were read upon the following subjects: "The Force of Habit," by Beardsley; "The Holy Spirit in Revivals," by J. H. Weston; "The Sunday Schools," by G. T. Price; "Heaven a Place," by S. W. Weiss; "Wyalusing District—Its Centennial Record—What Shall It Be?" by I. T. Walker; "Present Condition of the United States," by J. W. Norish; "A Review of Sketches of Creation, by Alexander Winchell, LL. D.," by Wm. Keatley; "Ministerial Fellowship," by Silas Barner.

The association requested Rev. I. T. Walker to publish his article in the local papers. On Wednesday evening, W. L. Thorpe, of Montrose preached a centennial sermon from the text, "Ye are the salt of the earth," after which the association adjourned to meet in Rome, Pa., at the call of the President, D. C. Barnes, Sec. Factorville, Pa., June 27, 1876.

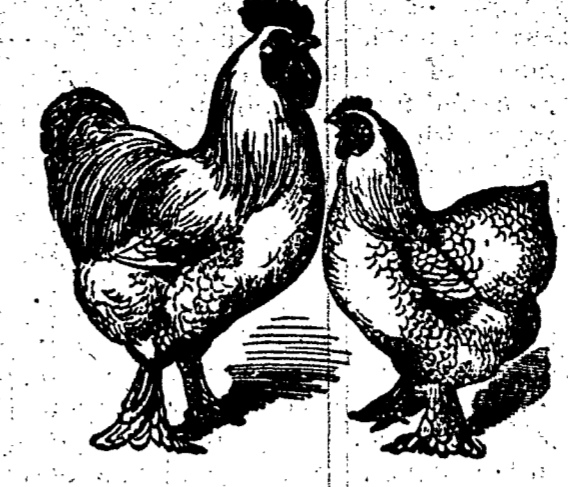
