Democratic Vigilance Committee. Democrat votes are annually lost in this county by a neglect to comply with the requirements of the law relative to assessments and payment of taxes.

Foreign born citizens wishing to vote next November must take out their naturalization papers a month before election. They must also be assessed two months previous to the day of voting.

The election will be held on "the Tuesday next following the first Monday of November," being this year the 7th day of the month. Monday, September 4, is the last day for being assessed.

Three persons have been appointed in each election district of the county whose duty in conjunction with the member of the county committee for their district, is to see to it that the above requirements are complied with and "let no delinquent escape."
