A NEW SECRET SOCIETY LAW.—According to a recent act of the legislature, passed in April, all members of beneficial societies are relieved from individual liability for lodge indebtedness.

NEW LAW AS TO THE TAKING OF DEPOSITIONS.—Among the important laws passed on the last day of the late session of Congress is the following, which has not been heretofore published.

Be it enacted, etc. That notices public of the several States, Territories and the District of Columbia, be and the same are hereby authorized to take depositions, and do all other acts in relation to taking testimony to be used in the courts of the United States, take acknowledgements and affidavits in the same manner and with the same effect as commissioners of the United States Circuit Court may lawfully take and do.

GAME LAWS—These, it seems, are not like under the laws of the Medes and Persians—they change from year to year. Yesterday we put it like this:

"Now hunt deer, elk, grouse or pheasant or prairie chicken, rail or reed bird and squirrel."

This is last year's law, and was obtained by placing an overweening confidence in the little work published by the Sportsmen's club of this city, and given us for our guidance in matters of this sort.

Now, however, the law has changed, and hence we put our foot in it. Now that we've got the club into trouble, they have sent us the very latest acts in the game laws—up to the very latest moment, we are informed, and we can now assert that deer, and grouse or pheasant or prairie chicken, must not be hunted until October first, and as for rail or reed bird, you can let siver at them all you like, while squirrel is hutable and shootable after July 1st.
