The Democratic Senatorial Conference meets to-morrow (Thursday) at Coyne's Hotel Honesdale, Wayne County, Pa.

It is said that the New York Times will shortly issue a campaign supplement to prove that the "dynamite fiend" did not commit suicide as reported, but is alive and well in the person of Governor Tilden.

Carl Schurz is the Wall street and Bondholder's Agent and if he can convince the people that it is a good thing to continue Grantism, all right, but the current is quite the other way.

In a private letter to a friend in Washington, Carl Schurz writes: "The German vote of Ohio is arrayed against us, and there is danger that we will lose the state."

The Republicans seem to be gratified in escaping defeat in Maine—Blaine telegraphs in glee that every member of Congress in the State, numbering five, were elected—we have no recollection when it was otherwise.

The Democratic party demand that the law be enforced. Against the employment of troops, illegally and unconstitutionally at the polls, it does protest—While it concedes the right of every colored Republican to vote as he chooses, it demands that every colored Democrat shall be fully protected in the same right.

South Carolina is to be carried by the Democrats this year, but by fair means, says the Columbia Register. The colored men will come into our ranks in such numbers as to possess almost a control in the party, and we would have no objection to that if they will put up a ticket of honest men.

A special law, passed in 1870, to save the worthless neck of Dr. Paul Schœppe from being stretched at Carlisle, after his conviction and sentence, still remains on the statute book, available for every rogue who is in a like strait.

The effect of this statute is practically to secure to every murderer two trials.

The triumph of the Democracy means that the "net ordinary expenditures" of the government will be kept inside of \$100,000,000. Last year they were \$171,000,000.

Republicans in Indiana say they will bet that blue jeans Williams will not get over eight thousand majority, but they don't put up the money. Democrats feel the majority will nearer double that.

The only prominent German paper in the Northwest that believes with Schurz and supports Hayes is the Chicago Staats Zeitung. Its editor, Boss Hering, is serving out a term in the penitentiary for robbing the revenues of the Government.

The Tribune is right in its remarks that the political conditions in Maine are very different from those in Ohio and Indiana. In all that portion of Maine that lies contiguous to the Canada border the people are directly or indirectly interested in smuggling, and they reap rich profits from a policy which robs the rest of the country.

At the Republican conference of this senatorial district held at the Tarbell House on Wednesday last, Geo. G. Waller, a lawyer of Wayne, was put in nomination. Mr. W. was a candidate for congress in Wayne county, but was beaten by Mr. Jadwin, and then he concluded to go for the State Senate.

There are four different statements of the amount of the national debt, all of them official, and yet varying as much as \$140,000,000. Senator Morton, one of the great Begums of Radicalism, says that it was \$2,640,348,000 on the 1st of July, 1866.

Prior to the invitation extended by President Grant to Gov. Hayes and his wife to spend a few days with the President's family at the Branch, Gov. Hayes addressed a frank manly letter to the President denying that he had any intention in his letter of acceptance to put any reflection on the policy of his Administration.

Are we to have no truth from party organs on any subject during a political campaign? The celebration of New York day at the Centennial grounds was in every way creditable to the managers of the Exhibition and the people of Philadelphia, but especially was it creditable to the Governor and people of the great State of New York.

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In 1875 the expenditures of the government, exclusive of interest on the public debt, pensions and all else that can be classed as war expenses, was \$171,000,000. The Democratic House reduced this \$30,000,000 for the present year, and would have reduced it \$60,000,000 but for the combined opposition of the President and the Senate.

The third "Camptown race" at Montrose resulted, finally, in the nomination of E. Overton, esq., of Bradford county, three of the Wayne conferees being "induced" by some mysterious influence to do what it was declared they never would do, and that was to go with Bradford county. Two years ago the Bradford conferees made a solemn contract with Wayne that it she would nominate Mr. Laporte that in 1876 Bradford would concede it to Wayne.

At last, and none too soon, we have the answer of Governor Tilden to the grave accusations made against the integrity of his income for 1862; and the dispassionate reader will be amazed, at the mendacity that has characterized his accusers. Coming from a journal of assumed and hitherto acknowledged respectability, the country paused to consider the charge, and had it not been conclusively answered it must have cost Mr. Tilden tens of thousands of votes; but we now have the answer, item by item with a minuteness of detail that forbids the possibility of evasion or concealment and no unbiased mind will fail to regard the Democratic candidate for President as fully vindicated.

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TILDEN'S MASTERLY VINDICATION.

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It is made even plausible in the face of anticipating explanations, is doubtless the reason for the rumor from Washington that the government has abandoned the purpose of instituting legal proceedings against Mr. Tilden for arrears of income tax. Had he been guilty of actual fraud as his reckless accusers have charged, the information necessary to sustain a prosecution would have been within reach of the government long since; but now, after flooding the country with this scandal, and persisting in it with relentless malignity for weeks it perishes before the sober searching truth like the mists of the morning before the genial rays of the sun.
