ANNUAL REPORT OF COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT.

Few things have occurred in this county the past year that demand especial record. The general work has continued to advance in interest and success.

I have sought at examinations, institutes, educational meetings, in the school-room, and at many other times, to impress upon teachers, and people the importance of greater acquaintance upon institutes, teachers' classes, reading of magazines and of works on teaching.

Our schools are crippled very much because so many children attend unsteadily, especially after schools have been in progress a few weeks just when they ought to be prepared to receive the greater benefit.

Our few Graded Schools continue to be a source of profit; aiding larger scholars to secure a better preparation for teaching and business.

Our County Institute was well attended and highly profitable, and the local institutes have been well received and have strengthened our work.

Our standard of qualification of teachers is gradually raised, and, with the assistance of Directors by a grading of wages we design to continue to raise the grade of certificates so that those who continue to teach must improve.
