The boy who picked these made a fatal mistake in not discerning the difference between poisonous fungi and a most delicious esculent; but are not others liable to make a like mistake, to be followed by a like fatality?

Of course there are tests by which the difference between toadstools and mushrooms can be determined with certainty. What are those tests? Again, is there no remedy for the poison of toadstools? It is said that the physician who was called to the New Jersey victims administered antidotes; but he was not consulted until twenty four hours after the poison had been taken, and we are not informed what were the medicines he gave. At all events they proved inefficacious, except in the case of the young lady who had partaken but sparingly.
