But he to whose memory we paid these tributes never flooded a land with blood, nor filled usion, all prepared with care. it with widows and orphans to gain a hero's name. His voice was never heard in legislative halls. He was little known beyond his own town and his own circle of friends. A young man earning his bread by honest toil, a humble clerk without wealth-his only nobility of descent, integrity and honor—he had by his true and blameless life earned the tribute thus paid his memory by those who knew him best. And so we mourned not outwardly in stereotyped phrase, as we mourn rulers and heroes. Our grief was real, its outward showing a heartfelt testimony to the worth of the departed.

As a business man his promise was rich, for he possessed all the qualities to insure success—sound judgment, ready tact, and unflagging industry.

As a son, he was affectionate, ever obedient, paying his parents the same difference and honor as a man, that he had accorded as a child. Making his father's house his home, the filial tie had never been weakened by separation, and its sudden rending by death, bows the bereaved ones low in the dust. We who knew him can sympathize with them for we know how great is their loss.

The estimation in which he was held by his townsmen was shown in the political canvass last year, when he was the Democratic candi date for the office of Register and Recorder.-Although his opponent was a worthy Republican and a veteran soldier—formerly a respect ed citizen of Great Bend-"Curt" received all but ten of the ballots cast for that office in the borough, and was defeated by less than one hundred votes in the county.

His illness was long and painful—a natural ly strong constitution, unsupped by excesses maintaining the unequal combat with disease, long after mutual science and hope had been exhausted.
