NEIGHBORING COUNTIES.

BRADFORD COUNTY, PA. The report that a citizen of Towanda lost \$800 by betting on election is denied by the Towanda papers.

Henry M. Davidson, of Towanda township, shot a large white owl recently. This species of owl is very rare in this section of the country.

The house of Mr. Wm. Squires of Herriek township, was totally destroyed by fire on Saturday last. The family were away from home at the time of the fire, and the house with its contents was entirely destroyed.

The Bradford Argus, of last week, gives the following account of a fatal and deplorable accident: Thursday last, 16th inst., Bela Cogswell and one of his neighbors went out to hunt in the woods.

LUZERNE COUNTY, PA. (From The Scranton Journal.) A son was born to Jack Hayes, of Seranton, on election night, and he named him Tilden Hayes.

The D. L. & W. R. R. bridge near Nicholson, was burned week before last, was re-built in the brief time of four days and a quarter. The bridge is four hundred and fifty feet long and sixty feet high.

The Luckawanna Valley House was again closed on Friday of last week, by executions against the proprietor, S. V. Derrah. It has this week, however, been re-opened by Mr. Goodenough, a former clerk of the hotel.

The market was flooded with poultry the two days previous to Thanksgiving, and prices ruled very low. We learn that some farmers late on Wednesday, closed out their chickens at five cents a pound and turkeys at nine cents.

Another reduction of about ten per cent, was made in the wages of the trackmen and others of the employees of the Delaware and Hudson Canal Co. on the 1st of December.

Superintendent Pearce informs us that the announcement in the papers that the Street Railway company have made arrangements to introduce dummy engines on the Providence and Green Ridge lines of street cars is premature, the company not contemplating such a change at present.

BROOME COUNTY, N. Y. (From The Democratic Leader) A joint Teachers' Association of the Eastern and Western Commissioner Districts of Broome county will be held on Saturday, Dec. 15, at Binghamton.

The dwelling house of Mr. L. Cook, on Glenwood Avenue, near Bigler's switch, west of this city, was destroyed by fire on Sunday morning about 2 o'clock. Being outside of the city limits the firemen could do nothing, owing to the absence of water. Everything in the house was burned. There was a small insurance on the contents. The origin of the fire is unknown.

She was in this city recently, in attendance at the funeral of a niece, and it was noticed that her actions were peculiar, so much so, that a letter was sent to the young lady's friends to watch her actions. After the father read the letter he went to the room of his daughter, and found that she had left it. A search was made and the following morning the body was found in the Chemung river. She was engaged to be married to Dr. W. A. Brooks, of this city.
