

The Case of Oregon.

We do not think Tilden is any more entitled to the electoral vote he has got in Oregon than Hayes is to those given to him in Louisiana.

The facts are these: The State gave a majority of about 1200 for Hayes. One of the three Hayes electors was postmaster at the time of his election, and so ineligible; and the Governor, who is a Democrat, and who the law directs "shall grant a certificate to the persons having the largest number of votes," held that by his ineligibility, the votes for him were null, and so gave the third elector's place to the fourth or Democratic candidate having the highest number of votes.

There is abundant legal authority and precedent for this decision; both American and English, as there is abundant legal authority and precedent for the different decision of the Vermont State officials in a precisely similar case.

The deserted Tilden elector thus found himself alone with his certificate, and having two vacancies on his hands, proceeded to fill them with men who are reported to be Democrats, but who nevertheless voted for Hayes, and this vote also goes on to Washington, one for Tilden and two for Hayes, with the valuable advantage of the Governor's certificate.

We believe Congress should go behind the Governor's certificate, and in obedience to the sound doctrine of President Lincoln "exclude" this vote "from the counting as illegal."

Obviously, these Oregon and Vermont cases just alike, but differently decided by the state authorities, present a question for the Supreme Court, as they do also for Congressional legislation.
