At the appointed time the institute was called to order. Exercises opened with music, after which Mr. Tilden read a select piece. On tures. motion, Dever Peck was elected assistant secretary. Mr. Thatcher then occupied a few moments in presenting to the institute his theory of teaching Geography. Mr. Griffis, teacher of the Harford Graded School, followed by a few remarks upon the subject of map drawing.-Discussions in regard to methods of teaching followed in which Mr. Thatcher, Miss Jones, Mr. and Mrs. U. B. Gillet took part. After a selection of music, Miss Maud Speacer, a member of the Soldiers' Orphan School, read an admirable essay entitled "The Bible the source of Civilization."

After a short intermission Mr. Griffis, teacher of the Harford Graded School, read an able essay on the important subject of "Ventilation" which provided some new ideas for consideration. The subject of History was touched upon and after a short discussion closed with a few remarks by Mr. Tilden John Rockwell of the Soldiers' Orphan School, read an essay "Obedience in childhood necessary to the making of good citizens." Music. Adjourned till 9 a m. on Saturday.

On Friday evening Mr. Tilden gave a very interesting lecture to a large audience in the M. E. church; at its close a vote of thanks, as a token of appreciation, was tendered him.

Saturday, Dec. 16th.—Opening exercises: music, reading of Scripture, Prayer by Rev. A. Miller. Mr. Tilden then made a few general remarks and read the extract, "Wanted a Minister's wife." Mr. Gillet then presented his method of teaching Practical Arithmetic, which was followed by lively discussions. On motion, Miss Jones, Mr. D. P. Brewster, and Mr. A. W. Wilmarth were appointed a committee on res olutions. Mr. W. L. Thatcher read an essay entitled "The study of Civil Government in the common schools." Mr. Tilden spoke in reference to a Teachers' Association, in accordance to resolutions passed at the County Institute last August. make arrangements for the first meeting, E. K. Richardson, of Great Bend, U. B. Gillet, of Gibson, C. T. Thorpe, of Susquehanna Depot: H. L. Griffls, of Harford, W. L. Thatcher, of Harford. Adjourned.

Afternoon session opened with music from the choir. An essay entitled "Composition in Primary Schools," by Miss S. J. Tingley secured close attention. Mr. Tilden followed with a few remarks upon the subject of teaching Grammar. Mr. E. W. Watson introduced a class exercise, on the same subject.

The following report of the committee on resolutions was then read and adopted:

Resolved, That great praise is due to our County Superintendent, W. C. Tilden, for the able manner in which he has conducted the proceedings of this Institute and for the uniform kindness and justice shown in the management of the educational interests of our county.

Resolved, That our thanks are due to the Methodist church of this place, for the use of their commodious house of worship, where we listened to the interesting and instructive address of Mr. Tilden, last evening.

Resolved, That we tender thanks to the se lect choir and its leader, Mr. Sophia, for the pleasing variety and added interest this music has afforded us during the last two days.

Pesolted, That we are grateful to the citizens of Harford for their hospitality and attention, and to the committee of arrangements for the care taken in providing for the comfert of the strangers in their midst.
