HOW MESSAGES ARE SENT BY THE OCEAN CABLE.

He (the ocean telegraph operator) taps the "key" as in a land telegraph, only it is a double key. It has two levers and knobs instead of one...

Now, in the land telegraph, the dashes and the dots would appear on the strip of paper at the other end of the line, which is unwound from a cylinder, and perforated by a pin at the end of the bar or armature...

The cable operator, however, has neither of these advantages. There is no paper to perforate, no click of the armature, no armature to click...

In the center of this is suspended a very thin delicate mirror about as large as a kernel of corn, with a correspondingly small magnet rigidly attached to the back of it...

This spot of light upon the scale is the index by which all messages are read. The angle through which the ray moves is double that traversed by the mirror itself; and it is therefore, really equivalent to an index four or six

fold in length without weight. To the casual observer there is nothing but a thin ray of light, darting to the right and left with irregular rapidity...
