DISSATISFIED DEMOCRACY.

In view of the recent outlandish manifestations of rejoicing at the triumph of might over right, and with the horrible dim of Monday night's Jubilee still sounding in our ears we heartily endorse the sarcastic remarks of the N. Y. World, that it is astonishing that so many Democratic citizens of the United States should be restive and ill-temperd under the deliberate frauds by which they have been deprived of a pacific victory honestly won at the polls in November last.

These wicked animals delight With savage rage to growl and bite; If you attack them they will fight.

But we entreat our Radical friends to have patience. This thing of first stealing the electoral votes of a State and then getting three Supreme Court judges to indorse the act, is new in the United States. After it has been tried three or four times people will be more patient under it.

A REPUBLICAN PRESCRIPTION.

We quote the above from the Harrisburg correspondence of the Republican.—The Mr. H., referred to is Mr. Hawley, the Senator from this district.

Failing to find any arguments to silence Mr. H. this representative of the high-moral-idea party, seeks by his advice to induce him to try the prescription (which thank God, is no longer distinctively democratic) that appears at the head of this article.

We venture the assertion that the "men in buckram," as the correspondent calls the respectable majority who elected Mr. H., will excuse any shortcomings of this kind, and honor him all the more highly for the gallant fight which he is making, almost single handed, against the money power, which is sucking the life blood of the State.

THE CABINET.

It seems to be conceded that Hayes' cabinet will be constructed something as follows. Secretary of State, Wm. M. Everts, of N. Y. Secretary of the Treasury, John Sherman, of Ohio. Sec. of the Interior, Carl Schurz, of Mo. Post Master General, David M. Key of Tenn.

RETURNING BOARD HAYES.

During the last eight years the principles of the Republican party appear to have been corrupt practices and the spoils of office. Its leaders have now consummated their crowning act of infamy by the sanction of fraud in the count of the votes at the late Presidential election, by which the clearly expressed will of the people is defeated.

AT THE LAST.

Almost the last official acts of Gen. Grant was his order to Gen. Augur, commanding at New Orleans, not to employ the military, under his command, in the interest or support of either of the existing state governments of Louisiana.

"In answer to your despatch of this date, the President directs me to say that he feels it his duty to state frankly that he does not believe public opinion will longer support the maintenance of the State government of Louisiana by the use of the military, and that he must concur in this manifest feeling.

We can only regret that nearly the whole of his official term should have been passed, before finding out that supporting state governments with the military, was contrary to the spirit of a "republican form of government."

CROOKEDNESS.

The devices to which the Electoral Commission were compelled to resort, to secure a majority of the Electoral vote for Hayes, are but little calculated to increase the faith of the common people in the integrity of the highest judicial body in the United States.

In the lower Courts, such practices would receive the condemnation of all classes of people, regardless of party or creed. Now, however the reformers of the high-moral-idea party can see no wrong in any line of conduct, which has resulted in the final triumph of the conspiracy of Morton, Chandler & Co.

Fifteen Judges once sat to determine between two claimants to an estate. One claimant had a forged and fraudulent will, while the other had the true testament of the testator. The question being as to which was the true, and which was the false paper, eight of the Judges decided that the only way to determine the question was to look at the two papers and decide in favor of that claimant which each Judge might hold in the highest esteem.

It must be refreshing to piety everywhere to observe that the chief organ of Beezlehub in this country, the New York Herald, desires that public prayers may be offered up for Returning Board Hayes. A million telephones connecting directly with heaven could not convey such an appeal as will avert the wrath of a just God whose commandment, Thou shalt not steal, has been violated in the face of the whole world by the miscreants who have perjured the Presidency.—Harrisburg Patriot.

Congressman Foster, of Ohio, says that "the Lord is a just Judge," from which it is evident that he did not vote with or influence the majority of the Electoral Commission in the Florida and Louisiana cases.

AT WASHINGTON. A dispatch to yesterday's Phila Times gives the following account of affairs at Washington: "Radical Democrats and Republicans do not conceal their disgust, for the former foresee in the faithful execution of the principles announced, a serious defection in the Democratic party south of the Potomac, and the latter that it will rally the support of the conservative element among Northern Republicans. The Northern adventurers who have kept the South in turmoil and plundered her State treasuries see the handwriting on the wall, and their intense disgust is scarcely describable. Democrats shake their heads, saying: "It may mean something; it may mean nothing. We shall be safe in giving our opinion when the Cabinet has been appointed and the Louisiana and South Carolina difficulties have been solved by the new administration. We fear the influence of that narrow minded John Sherman." A Republican Senator declared to-day that he considered Hayes another Andrew Johnson, and another said Hayes had refused to divide. The new Senator from Illinois, Judge Davis, pronounces the inaugural one of the best State papers he has ever heard. Bob Ingersoll is credited with saying that "this is Andy Johnson over again, before he has slept one night in the White House." A leading Democrat, who looks on from a high elevation, says there's thunder and lightning ahead. The Morton, Blaine, and Cameron element will lock horns with the Sherman and the "go-South" element and there will be a rattling among the dry bones. Conkling is reticent and ugly."

The decision of the electoral commission handing over the presidency to the minority candidate has been received throughout the country with that silent contempt which the nature of the act deserves. Thoughtful and patriotic republicans cannot rejoice over a triumph for which they are indebted to persons who have only escaped the penitentiary because their crimes have remained unpunished, and democrats have such thorough reasons for disgust that they are not expected to receive their defeat with any complacency whatever. The appearance of Mr. Hayes in Washington on Friday was the signal for a rush of people who hope to serve themselves in paying court to the new administration. The postmasters have thrown up their caps to him and the tidentwaters have burned sporadic powder, but the sullen masses hold back their acclams. They indulge in the sturdy opinion that the receiver of stolen goods is as bad as the thief, and that a stolen presidency in any man's possession gives him no better title to respect than any other sort of plunder found upon his person or in his keeping. This sullen disregard and disrespect has never heretofore attached to the executive office. Even men so cordially hated as Presidents Tyler and Johnson were despised for opinion's sake. They came by their great office with unlowered crests and held it by an unallied title. But every act of Mr. Hayes will be smirched with illegitimacy. He begins wrong and must end wrong. The people of the United States know it, and they cannot jubilate over the disgrace of the country.—Harrisburg Patriot.

The inauguration of R. B. Hayes as President of the United States took place on Monday, and thus closes the first act in the new era of fraud, upon which our unhappy country has begun.

The bitter lesson which the defeated party has been taught, will in the nature of things, bear fruit, and elections by the people may justly be considered a thing of the past. Under the precedents established by a majority of the Supreme Court, the party in power, controlling the final canvass of the vote, are by virtue of such power, the only party authorized to proclaim the result of an election that may be held in the future.

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
