The following letter has been ad-South Carolina:

EXECUTIVE MANSION, WASHINGTON, MARCH 23, 1877.—Sir: I am instructed by the President to bring to your attention his purpose to take into immediate consideration the position of affairs in upon succeeding to the Presidency. It would give the President great pleasure to confer with you in person, if you shall find it convenient to visit Washington, and shall concur with him in thinking, upon a conference, the readiest and best mode of placing your views as to the political situation in your State before him. He would greatly prefer this direct communication of opinion and information to any other method of ascertaining your views upon the present condition and immediate prospect of public interests in South Carolina. If reasons of weight with you should discourage this course, the President will be glad to receive any communication from you in writing or through any delegate possessing your confidence that will convey to him your views of the impediments to the peaceful and orderly organization of a single and undisputed State Government in dec'd. In furtherance of the prompt and safe execution of this general purpose he invites a full communication of your opinions on the whole subject in such one of the proposed forms as may seem to you most useful.

It is said that Gov. Hampton will not go to Washington but will present in writing, a full and succinct account of the election last fall, and the present condition of the State. Chamberlain will present his case in person.

For the settlement of the Louisiana matter, the President proposes a commission to be composed of eminent men of both parties who shall go to Louisiana and after an observation of the condition of affairs make a report, upon which report the President will base his action in the premises. The difficulty seems to be finding the proper persons to act, as the President has been in telegraphic communication with several gentlemen on the subject of the Commission, but for various business, and other reasons they have declined to act. Among others mentioned in connection with the Commission are Hon. E. R. Hoar and Charles Francis Adams of Massachusetts, Benjamin Harrison of Indiana, Robert Ingersoll of Illinois, Thomas A. Hendricks of Indiana, Herschell V. Johnson of Georgia, and John Young Brown of Kentucky. From present indications it is probable that the commission will be difficult to constitute, and that the committee will not be ready for starting before the middle or end of the present week. In fact there are a great many prominent gentlemen of both parties who are strong in the belief that it will have to be abandoned altogether; in which case Mesers. Nacholls and Packard will be invited to come to Washington to consult with the President and his cabinet.
