Neighboring Counties. An inmate of the Luzerne county poor house has not eaten any food for seventeen days.

The mayor of Wilkes-Barre sentenced a man to ten days hard labor on the highways, for drunkenness.

The Lehigh Valley Railroad is doing a heavy business shipping oil from the west. 150 cars are now transferred at Waverly each day.

The Scranton Relief Association has for several weeks afforded steady relief to 300 families. Their relief store will be closed after May 19.

The Lehigh Valley shop hands at Hazleton and elsewhere have agreed to cooperate with their fellow employes of Wilkes-Barre in the latter's effort to have the 10 per cent. recently taken off their wages restored.

Mrs. D. W. Brown, of Wyalusing, died after a long and painful illness on Monday morning of last week. Deceased was a mother of Dr. M. M. Brown, of Jimca, and Mrs. Geo. V. Myer, of Towanda, and was one of the most estimable ladies in Bradford county.

A man named Connell, living on Shanty Hill, near Scranton, has become possessed with the idea that his house is infested with witches, and it is necessary to keep him under lock and key to prevent him from burning the house to get rid of the fancied intruders.

Henry Reel, a clerk in the Wilkes-Barre post office, who absconded last winter with some of the funds, became a vagrant in the streets of London, and finally ended in the almshouse, from which he was taken and enlisted in the British army.

Wilson France, of Monroe, Wyoming county, died last week from the effects of a blow he received about a month ago from Geo. Hilbert, while accompanying a lady home from church.

A saw mill and planing mill in East Lehigh, Wyoming Co., belonging to Mr. William M. Stark was destroyed by fire Wednesday night last. The fire was discovered about 11 o'clock. The mill and about 10,000 feet of lumber are a total loss.

The Scranton Republican referring to the Providence association bill, says: "Governor Hartranft is condemned here without stint for approving the bill, and it is well for the credit of the administration in this section that the popular voice can not express itself just now upon his excellency at the polls."

The fuel costs but a trifle, and will give the establishment great advantage over the manufacturers in the country.—Reporter.

State Items. A red wolf has been shot in Lehigh county, the first in seventy years. Three hundred and fifty rafts have been run out of Red Bank this season.

It is rumored that the Blair iron and coal company is about stopping its two furnaces at Hollidaysburg. Robert Robertson, sixty years old, fell into a creek near Tide-oute a few days ago and was drowned.

The Wilkes-Barre base ball club has a grand stand which can accommodate 4,000 persons. Eight of the thirty-two blast furnaces in the Shenango valley, and eleven of the twenty-two in the Mohoning valley are blazing.

A large number of miners have been thrown out of employment by the stoppage of work by the Penn gas coal company at Penn station, western Pennsylvania. Bogus spiritualistic performances, if wise, will give Titusville the go by.

Twenty years ago H. N. Walton, of Washington county, lost a watch, which he supposed had been stolen. The other day he plowed it up in one of his fields, which he cleared in 1857. Seven convicts were taken to the eastern penitentiary on Wednesday by the sheriff of Luzerne county.
