DOINGS OF THE WEEK.

Some stirring events in the war situation have occurred since our last edition but as yet no decisive battle has been fought. The opposing armies are getting uncomfortably close, and both are consolidating their forces preparing for a big fight. There has been severe fighting in Asia Minor, Cn Saturday the Rus sians attacked a division of the Turkish army in the direction of Taher Pass, but, after five hours' desperate lighting, were repulsed with heavy loss. The cordon around Kars and Erzeroum is daily growing tighter, as the Russians, notwithstanding their losses, have yet a force largely experior to the Turks, and as they have gained some advantages, improve them all they can. Their artillery practice is telling on Tarkish fortifications, and their eventual success is gene ray conceded, though it will cost them dearly. On the other hand, Constantinople dispatches report that Miskhtar Pasha has been heavily reinforced, and can now withstand all attacks, and even act on the offensive. A dispatch from Turkish source also reports that on Friday, June 15. 13,000 Russians who occupied Mexwikd and Tchamtchara have been driven out by Turkish troops and iron clads.-A movement has been undertaken to cut off their retreat.

An Indian Uprising.

The following particulars have been received of the Indian outbreak in Idaho and Oregon:

News was received at Lewiston, Idaho, on Friday last. Two friendly Indians and several citizens left the Lapwai garrison, under command of Colonel Perry, for Mount Idaho. Soon afterward news Secretary...... Treasurer (2 per cent on \$1.335) was received that Captain James, Baker, Sam'l Benedict and wife and four children, Harry Mason, Henry Eifers and Warren's expressman, had been killed on Salmon named Davenport and Ousley, killed. Two half-breed Indians escaped. A dispatch came through to Lewiston to the effect that Colonel Perry reached Mount Idaho Saturday morning and found the reports of the slaughtering of the whites true; that the Indians had gone to the Salmon river and troops were in pursuit Salmon river and troops were in pursuit of them. Messages from Kamakai, brought by Indian runners to the agency state that 29 whites had been killed, and that the whites had killed White Bird, the chief of the band of hostiles, together with his family.
