RESOLUTION RELATIVE TO THE AMENDMENT OF THE CONSTITUTION CONSTITUTION

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representa tives of the Common realth of Penn'a in General itsembly wet, That the Constitution of this Common of the fifth article, so that it shall read as follows:

The Judges of the Supreme Court, of the several Courts of Common Plens and of such other Courts. Courts of Common Pleas, and of such other Courts f Record as are or shall be established by law, shall be elected by the qualified electors of the Commonwealth in the manner following, to wit: The Judges of the Supreme Court, by the qualified lectors of the Commonwealth at large. The Presi dent Judges of the several Courts of Common Pleas and such other Courts of Record as are or shall be established by law, and all other Judges required to be learned in the law, by the qualified electors of the respective districts over wich they are to preside or act as Judges. And the Associate Judges of the Courts of Common Pleas by the qualified electors of the Counties respectively.— The Judges of the Supreme Court shall hold then offices for the term of fifteen years if they so long behave themselves well (subject to the allotment hereinafter provided for, subsequent to the first election:) The President Judges of the several Courts of Common Pleas, and of such other courts of Record as are or shall be established by law. and all other Judges required to be learned in the years, if they shall so long behave themselves well: The Associate Judges of he Courts of Common pleas shall hold their offices for the term of five years, if they shall so long behave themselves two-thirds of each branch of the Legislature. The first election shall take place at the general election of this Commonwealth next after the adoption of this amendment, and the commissions of all the Judges who may be then in office shall expire on the first Monday of December following, when the terms of the new judges shall commence. The persons who shall then be elected Judges of the Supreme Court shall hold their offices as follows: one of them for three years, one for six years, one for nine years one for twelve years, and one for fif-teen years the term of each to be decided by lotby the said judges as soon after the election as concuient, and the result certified by them to the Governor, that the commissions may be issued in accordance thereto. The judge whose commission will first expire shall be Chief Justice during his term, and thereafter each judge whose commission shall first expire shall in turn be the Chief Justice, and if two or more commissions shall expire on the same day, the judges holding them shall decide by lot which shall be the Chief Justice. Any vacancles happening by death, resignation, or otherwise, in any of the said courts, shall be filled by appointment by the Governor, to continue till the first Mentay of December succooling the next general election. The Judges of the Supreme Court, and the Presidents of the several Courts of Common Pleas shall at stated times, receive for their servi-ces an adequate compensation, to be fixed by law which shall not be diminished during their contain, ance in office, but they shall receive no fees or per-quisites of office, nor hold any other office of profit under this Commonwealth, or under the govern-ment of the United States, or any other State of this Union. The Judges of the Supreme Court during their continuance in office shall reside within this Commonwealth and the Commonwealth, and the other Judges during their continuance in office shall reside within the district or county for which they were respectively elected.


