The Grape is now one of the most market ble fruits that can be raised. It is easily litysted, requiring but little room and little bor, and besides its value as a marketable duct supplies a most agreeable, cooling d refreshing article for family use.

The foreign varieties are, as a general g, much too fragile and delicate to justiany attempts to cultivate them, unless uner very peculiar circumstances; but we have Ellensborough, Catawaba, and the Isabelall of which are native grapes, very hardy d prolific, and capable of rewarding alnost any degree of care and attention that he cultivator may be pleased to accord to hem. We do not enumerate these because bey comprise the whole list of grapes, capale of withstanding the algid temperature of ur climate, but simply because they are adily obtained, are generally well known and linghly esteemed. As to the lucrativess of this fruit, it is asserted that an indiridual residing at Camden, New Jersey, cends annually to the Philadelphia market, everal thousand weight of the Isabella and Catawaba grapes, for which he receives from ten to twelve cents per pound. These varieties are very prolific. The Ellensborough produces fruit smaller in size, but excellent nequality, and is, perhaps on many accounts

the best native grape we have. In cultivating grapes one thing appears to be indispensable. viz: The selection of a suitable soil. This should be a free moist. warm and rich loam, and replete with those principles of vegetable productiveness which are supplied by the foliage of the vine it is required to support.

The very best compost that can be had for this purpose, is formed of the foliage and tendrils of the vine itself; and hence in pruuing no particle of those portions which it may be necessary to remove should be lost MARK J. Remedy for Bots.

A writer in the Germantown, Ohio, Gazette recommends the following remedy, for the cure of bots in horses. Tobacco juice, that is, the water in which tobacco has been soaked, is an approved remedy, and certain death to the bots. We know several instances of the efficacy of this treatment, and farmers whose horses are thus afflicted can try it with safety. The tobacco in order to obtain the jnice very strong, may be boiled, or put in hot wa-

Editor North American Farmer. When a horse has bots, it may often be known by his biting his sides; when he has many, they often throw him into great pain and he lays down, rolls and if not cured soon, dies. When it is believed that a horse has the bots, by the above symptoms, give a pint of sweet milk, and one pint of molasses, well mixed together, and they will let go their hold on the horse, and feast on the

milk and molasses. "In five minutes after you give the milk and molasses, give the horse three fourths of a pint of tobacco juice, strong enough to kill the bots; when it reaches the bots it kills them, as all will believe who have ever spit tobacco juice on a worm or other similar insect; the horse in less than one hour, will have perfect rest, and no mistake, though no patent has been obtained. The writer would not have it tried on an old, goor horse, for he would certainly recover, to the damage of his owner. 
