Apple Trees.

A writer in one of the New England papers on the subject of Fruits and Fruit Trees, gives us the following hints, which are worthy of the consideration of our farmers.

A single lateral and over-topping branch if of some size, is sure to cripple, if not to prevent the growth of the one you engrave; and the universality of this effect, as seen all about the country, we should think might correct the system of many an otherwise excellent operator.

Respecting the size and age of trees for grafting, it seems not to be known, that vigor, and not years, is the turning point of practicability. No one has lived long enough in our country to see a well-conditioned apple-tree, (we mean one in a moist, fertile soil with a little root wash, and not having had too many of its tap roots torn off by the plough.)

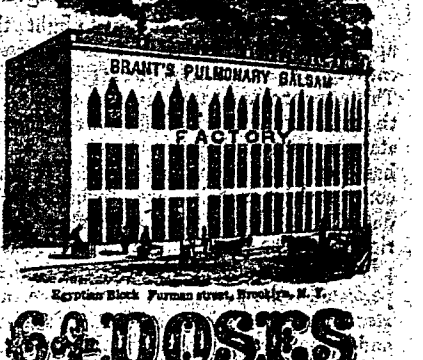
