THE FUGITIVE SLAVE BILL. The men of Susquehanna county prepared to say that this law meets with their approbation! Are they prepared to say that they are in favor of a law which vests the judicial authorities of the general government in the hands of petty commissioners...

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CONCERNING THE LIBERTY OF CONSCIENCE. The determination should be made by the Legislature, and not by the Executive. Governor Gen. Walbach had ordered the Court Martial, and as appears from his action in the matter, must have been of opinion, that the finding of the Court was illegal...

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JUDGES JESSUP AND LOWRY.
