Defeat of Judge Campbell.

Hon. James Campbell was nominated by the Harrisburg Convention as a candidate for Judge of the Supreme Court. Course then he was not entitled to any support from the Whig party.

But some injudicious friends, instead of meeting as they could be met these objections, announced that he was opposed on religious grounds.
