Resolved, That we are in favor of the largest Liberty to the largest number every where, and that we sympathise with all who are struggling for freedom in every land, whether it be with the starved sons of Erin, the betrayed patriots of Hungary, the gagged Republicans of France or the benighted fugitives of

Resolved, That we extend especial sympathy to Kossuth in his efforts to give liberty to his Fatherland, and to establish as a law of nations the great principles of non-intervention.

Resolved, That we recognise in John P. Hale, of New Hampshire, an able and fearless advocate of the inalienable rights of man, and a faithful exponent of the great principles of human Liberty we so fondly cherish.

Resolved, That we send a Delegate to the National Free Soil Convention to be held in Pittsburg in August next, with instructions to vote for John P. Hale, as the first choice of this meeting for President of the United States.

Resolved, That we appoint Horace

Brewster, Delegate to the Pittsburg Convention, with power to substitute.
