A VETERAN Whig.—Among the first voters we noticed at the polls at the late election was John Shryock, Esq., who cast his sixtieth vote for State and County officers. He is now eighty-one years of age, and has yet the first time to miss a State or Presidential election. On the morning of the last election he walked into town, a distance of nearly a mile, and voted the whole Whig ticket, as has been his invariable practice since the present organization of parties. He has voted twice for Jefferson, twice for Madison, twice for Monroe, twice for Jackson, whom he deserted in 1832; twice for Clay, twice for Harrison, once for Taylor, and he hopes to be able to walk into town on the second of November next and cast another, probably his last, Presidential vote, for Winfield Scott. We commend his example to our young Whigs especially, and hope that the old veteran of the Whig ranks may still have many peaceful years in store for him.—Chambersburg.
