Shadow and Permanent Pastures.

Prominent among the productive interests of our state are those of grazing and the dairy. The hills and valleys the pure streams and fresh air are peculiarly adapted to the feeding of cattle sheep and horses and to the profitable results of well-ordered dairying.

Rich and permanent pastures for feeding, and productive meadows, and well cultivated fields for hay and fodder, are here of primary importance. Properly speaking, meadows are fields of cultivated grass, and a system should be adopted and practiced to make them really such.

The nutritive elements of grass, are owing chiefly to the sugar which they contain, as these are in different degrees, it forms another characteristic to guide us in the choice of pasture and meadow grasses.

Grasses ripen their seed as early as June, and in July, August and September. The seed, when mature, is full and plump, and the plants which occupy the low and moist grounds, will not thrive on mountain rocky slopes and summit.

Carrots as Provender.

In the Massachusetts Plowman we find a communication from Mr. H. Ware, Jr., of the Farnham Farm, Salem, Mass., in which he has his experience in the use of Carrots as food for horses and cattle. He states that he had tried to his horses for the last ten years, that they prefer them to any other food, and that they are good for colic, and are also good for poultry. The man who raised him with a little bean or corn, he says, are excellent. "I give my horses half, once a day, about a peck—this being about one third of their keeping. For horses and for milk cows, and moderate driving, I consider carrots worth about half as much as the same weight of good hay. For stable horses, I need to be driven hard. I should have a greater quantity, I think them too laxative, and a more stringent feed better. For working cows, I think them very highly, as they promote health, strength and ability to perform labor. For milk cows, carrots are valuable, as they improve the quality of the milk, and increase the quantity. Their effect on the animal is decidedly good.

My own experience, as all the information I possess from those who have been in the way of raising and feeding the carrot, agrees with this statement. The only thing that I cannot understand is that our farmers do not cultivate them more generally—that all of them who have stock do not raise the same quantity that they raise in crops of potatoes, plant their quarter, half, or one acre.

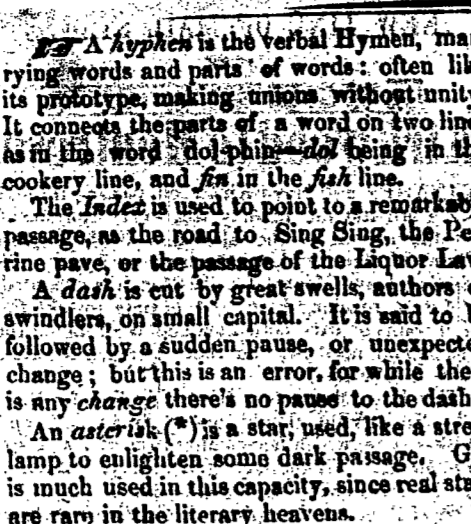

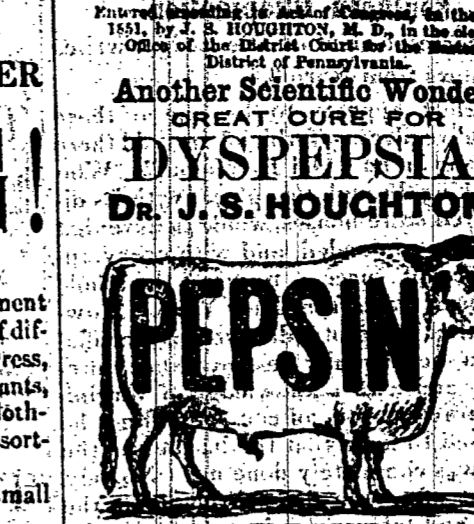
