## Dentists

On Wednesday, the 24th day of March, 1853, at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Long, Junia F. Karr, the 84th year of her age.

The venerable lady, whose decease we mention above, was formerly Mrs. Walworth, wife of Judge Walworth, who died September 1st, 1812. In 1812 Judge Walworth removed with his family from Connecticut to Cayuga county, N. Y., and in 1800 removed to Ithaca, where he resided for the first eight years of his life, residing in a tent pitched in the woods until he could erect a log cabin at the house of a pioneer. In 1805 Mr. Walworth removed with his family to this city and resided here until his death.

Four or five years after the death of Judge Walworth, Mrs. Walworth was married to Mr. Hayes, of Batavia, N. Y., and resided there until her death. She then removed with her children to this city, and has remained with her children.

She was a woman of energetic spirit and remarkable force of character, and well fitted to be the wife of a pioneer. Four or five years since she received a paralytic shock, which rendered her almost helpless, and at times her sufferings were most intense; but she bore them with great cheerfulness and fortitude, and would say, "As the Lord's friends and children are enabled to make their situation as comfortable as it was possible to make it." During the past season she seemed to suffer less, and was in a measure insensible to objects about her, and during the last week of her life she failed gradually and almost imperceptibly, passing away from us without a struggle, and as calmly as if falling asleep.
