

**The Susquehanna Seminary.**  
At the late Wyoming Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, held at Brooklyn, Pa., on the 27th of July, definite action was taken on the subject of the proposed Seminary which has been agitated in this part of the Conference for some months past; and so often brought to the attention of our readers. After full discussion the project was adopted, we understand, unanimously, and it was resolved to go forward to the speedy accomplishment of the undertaking. The name at the head of this article was selected at that by which the new institution is to be known, and it will be located somewhere in the Valley, the most beautiful, picturesque and healthful of any in the State, after which it is appropriately called. A Board of Commissioners was appointed, to meet on the 13th of September, visit the different places where facilities have been tendered for the establishment of the Seminary, examine the various sites offered, and determine the location.

The Commissioners are, Rev. George Peck, D. D., of Wilkes-Barre; Rev. N. Rounds, of Honesdale, Pa.; Rev. D. A. Shepard, of Kingston, Pa.; Hon. Amasa Dana, of Ithaca, N. Y.; Rev. J. M. Snyder, of Newark, N. Y.; Urbane Burrows, Esq., of Gibson, Pa., and William Macclure, Esq., of Deposit, N. Y.

Rev. H. R. Clarke, late Minister of the Court Street M. E. Church in this village, was appointed Agent for the Seminary, and will soon enter upon the duties connected with the appointment.—*Binghamton Democrat.*
