I then strain the milk into anothcream to rise in the usual way. Cream procured in this way will seldom require twenty minutes to churn, while by the common gractise the poor dairy maid may often churn for hours, and then perhaps have to throw all away, as I did on two occasions, before I happened to gain this valuable information.
