To keep Wheel Tires Tight. A correspondent of the Southern Planter gives the following mode of preparing the

I ironed a wagon some years ago for my own use, and before putting on the tires, I ried a Queen Ann which had done service filled the felloes with linseed oil; and the tires at the conquest of Canada twenty years prehave worn out and were never loose. I ironed a buggy for my own use, seven years ago and the tires are now as tight as when put on. My method of filling the felloes with oil is as follows: I use a long cast iron oil heater, made for the purpose, the oil is brought to the boiling heat, the wheel is placed on a stick, so as to hang in oil, each felloe one hour for a common sized felloe. The timber should be dry, as green timber will not receive oil. Care should be taken that the oil be made no hotter than the boiling heat in order that the timber be not burnt. Timber filled with oil is not susceptible of water and the timber is much more dutable. I was amused, some time ago, when I told a blacksmith how to keep tires tight on the wheels, by his telling me it was a profitable business to tighten tires; and the wagon maker will say it is profitable to him to make and repair wheels-but what will the farmer who supports the wheelright and smith,

Sinope. Sinope, which has become suddenly so marked a place as being the scene of the recent naval battle between the Turks and the Russians, is an ancient city, and was in former ages a very important commercial point, and not without a place in political history.

It was founded by a colony from Miletus about 700 years before Christ, the exact date of its origin being unknown. Its name is supposed to have been taken from that of Sinope, a daughter of the Asopus, who was stolen away by Apollo, and carried to the shores of the Euxine Sea, the gods of this time having a very disreputable practice of stealing handsome young ledies, from their homes. Miletus was the mother of many colonies, but no one of them was of more consequence than Sinope. The place was selected because of its defensibility on the side of the sea, and the convenience of its harbors, of which there were two, one on each side of the peninsula, whereon the city was built. Rapidly rising to wealth, and becoming the most important commercial city on the Euxine, it founded many colonies, the most famous of which was Trapezus, the modern Trebizonde, a name so eminent in the romance of the history of the middle ages. It was what we should call a State, as it had much territory to depend on it, which at one time reached as far as the river Halys; and New York. (up stairs.) it maintained wars with the Persian satraps of Papalagonia and Cappadocia. It figures quite conspicuously in Xenophon Anabasis. In after time, it lost its independence, and became part of the dominions of the Kings of Pontus. The great Mithridates was bern there, who made it his capital. It was taken by Lucellus in the Mithridatic war, and became part of the Roman dominion, Cæsar himself sending a colouy there. Its greatness, however, departed with its indedence. It was respectable, but nothing more. taken by the Turks a few years after the conquest of Constantinople. The modern name of the place is Sinoub, or Sinub.— Like Cadiz, it has maintained in modern times no inconsiderable share of its ancient importance as a seat of commerce. Diogenes, the most celebrated of the cynic school,

was a native of Sinope.

A writer in the National Intelligencer is rather down on Mexico, its cooking arrangements especially. Many of our poorest people (he says) would consider their lot a hard one if they were compelled to live upon the food that Mexicans live upon who are considered pretty well off. Goats milk, mush, and beans are their principal articles of food; few of them taste meat more than once week, and fewer still know any thing of coffee, tea, or sugar. One night, tired, wet and hungry, he stopped at a house, and, after being kindly received by an old lady; he asked her if she could make him some coffee. 'Si, Senor,' said she. After waiting some little time the supper was brought in. Among B. R. LYONS & CO., Wholesale & the dishes was one that attracted his attention a great deal. As he thought he had never seen any thing like it before, he refused to touch it, thinking he would make his supper on bread and coffee. As the coffee did not make its appearance, he ventured to inquire of the landlady what had become of it. "Here it is, sir," said she, very politely handing him the dish that had excited his curiosity. And there was his coffee, sure enough all stewed up in mutton tal low! After that time when he wanted any coffee he made it himself. Knives and forks are seldom seen in a Mexican house, as their food is mostly boiled or hashed up so very soft as to be eaten with a spoon. The spoons are made of tortillas, something like a buckwheat cake, which is doubled between the fingers, each fold being devoured with what it conveys to the mouth, thus having the advantage of a new spoon for every mouthful. Tables and chairs are equally dispensed with; at meals even they sit upor the floor, and take their dishes upon their knees. The women never eat with the men. seldem in their presence, but by themselves, mostly around the chimney corner in the kitchen. Butter is an article of which they know nothing, except what little they may have seen Americans use. The extravagant use of red pepper (chide colorada) in all their meals has often been related by travellers. They use it as sauce for almost everything; and although the Americans at first repent having tasted it, with tears in their eves, they soon become accustomed to it, and relish it as highly as the Mexicans.
